This past year has been a very active one for the Foundation as we have worked to fulfill our mission: "The David Raymond Price Foundation increases awareness of depression among youth through education".

We have just completed the first year of our multi-year funding commitment and joint effort with Johns Hopkins Medicine to expand their Adolescent Depression Awareness Program (ADAP) to schools throughout Greater Washington, D.C. and Dallas, Texas. The program is taught in either ninth or tenth grade classrooms, typically over a three day period, by dedicated and extraordinary educators at the respective schools. These educators are trained and overseen by the professionals of Johns Hopkins Medicine: Karen Swartz, M.D., Sallie Mink, R.N. and Kathryn Heley. Additionally, in an effort to share this education with parents, an evening program is held for parents of the participating schools. Landon School hosted the 2008 Parents Program in January and National Cathedral School will host the 2009 program on February 10th. In June, an educator training session was held at Landon School for those schools teaching the ADAP during the 2008/2009 School Year. On January 14, 2009, Landon School will host our third Adolescent Depression Awareness Program educator training session provided by Johns Hopkins Medicine.
